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# Definitions



- **Participatory Research (PAR)**: Research that actively involves community members as partners, not merely as subjects (Israel et al., 2005).
- **Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR)**: An approach that equitably engages community members, organizational representatives, and researchers throughout the research process (Israel et al., 2019).
- **Other Research Partnerships**: Academic-community partnerships and patient-led research.

# Literature on Participatory Research

- “participatory research” OR “community based participatory research” OR “community led research” [TITLES/ABSTRACTS] = 6,181 results
- Earliest in 1981 in *Canadian and International Education*
- Topics ranged (e.g., nursing, gender and culture, HIV/AIDS, breast and cervical cancer, learning disabilities)
- Earlier pubs consistent in terms
- “co production research” [TITLES/ABSTRACTS] = 16 results
  - + “autism” = 0 results
- PAR or CBPR and autism: *Autism Research 2023* and only a handful of other pubs in recent years

# Historical Context

- Emerged in the mid-20th century as an alternative to traditional top-down research approaches
- Initially used in social sciences to *challenge traditional power dynamics* between researchers and subjects.
- Closely aligned with civil rights movements and social justice initiatives
- Evolved as a *democratic approach* to research, focused on including community members in the research process to ensure that the research is *equitable and socially just*
- Principles of social justice inherent in participatory research make it suitable for autism research, where there is a need to *challenge prevailing norms* and to include marginalized voices

# Importance Today

- Initial focus on community concerns and social inequities



- Potential to produce effective, sustainable, and just solutions



# Participatory Research (PAR) in Autism Communities

- Rooted in the principle that research *should involve people who are the focus* of the research
- Can be applied in various settings and *not confined solely to community contexts*
- Democratizing knowledge, recognizing diverse forms of expertise, and ensuring participants have a voice in decision-making throughout research process
- Goal is often *empowerment and transformation*

# Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR) in Autism Communities

- A type of participatory research
  - *Co-learning* and *reciprocal transfer* of expertise
- **Co-production** of knowledge
  - Define problems, design the study, interpret results, implement solutions
- Ethical considerations
  - Informed consent and assent
- *Sustainable* community change, *improved* health outcomes, and *elimination* of health disparities
- Challenges and opportunities



# Academic Autism Spectrum Partnership in Research and Education (AASPIRE)

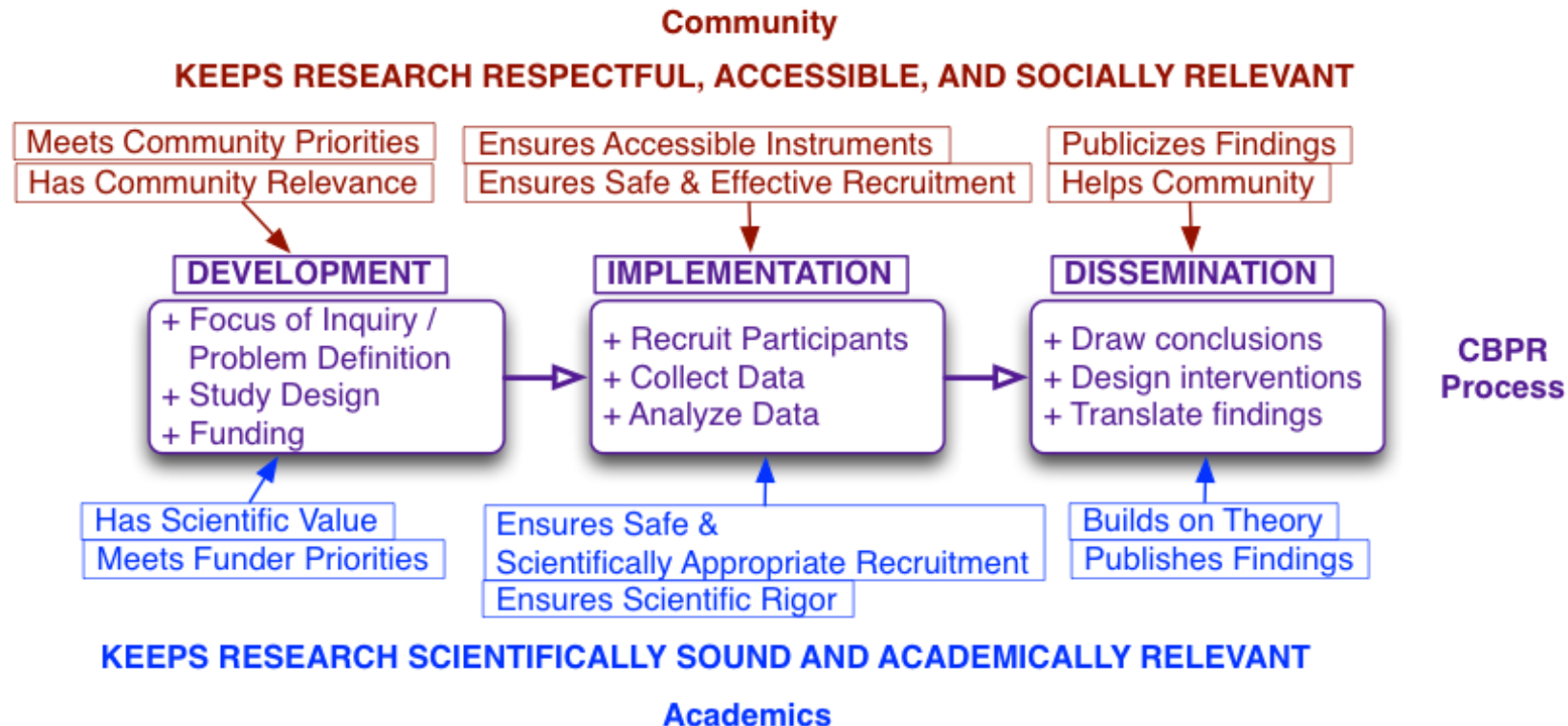


diagram from *Collaboration strategies in non-traditional CBPR partnerships: Lessons from an academic-community partnership with autistic self-advocates* [2].

# Autism Intervention Research Network on Physical Health (AIR-P)

- Create and disseminate evidence-based practices to *improve the physical health and well-being* of children and adolescents on the autism spectrum and other developmental disabilities
- *Vetted and co-developed* by the Autistic Researcher Review Board, caregivers and family members of autistic individuals, and other stakeholders
- Involves professionals from various disciplines such as pediatrics, psychiatry, and gastroenterology
- Community outreach, webinars, and training programs for both healthcare providers and families
